

Francine Kiefer has been a journalist for more than 25 years, most of them with the Pulitzer-Prize winning newspaper, *The Christian Science Monitor*. An experienced editor and writer, Ms. Kiefer is an editorial writer for the *Monitor*. She has served as the *Monitor's* White House correspondent, reporting on George W. Bush and Bill Clinton, and was the *Monitor's* bureau chief in Germany during the fall of the Berlin wall, from 1989-1993. For nearly five years, she was the foreign and national news editor for the *San Jose Mercury News* in California's Silicon Valley. Kiefer has appeared as a guest on CNN, C-SPAN, MSNBC, Fox News, National Public Radio, and various German TV and radio programs.

Kiefer is also writing a book about Hans Vogel, a political opponent to Hitler, that's based on his letters to his children during the Third Reich. She expects to finish her master's degree in Creative Nonfiction Writing at Goucher College in August 2008. She graduated from Smith College in 1980. Kiefer was also a Robert Bosch fellow in Germany from 1988-89. She and her husband, Mark Sheehan, live in Washington, D.C., close to where Kiefer grew up.
